received an honorable mention at the Members Show at Florida Craftart. The exhibit will be up until February 25.


Susan Robinson is excited to announce that Valdosta National 2022 has chosen her quilt, *I Have a Plan and Purpose for you*, (far right) for their

announcement flyer and it was also published in the local newspaper representing the show. Sue feels honored and plans to visit the show later this month.



Statewide News ... Guest Teacher in February

Join us for a Zoom lecture with Ann Johnston offered by the Florida region of SAQA. Open to all SAQA members. February 8, 2022 at 7PM Eastern Standard Time. Fee is \$5 for non -Florida members. Free to Florida members, but all must register. The registration will be in the SAQA store in January. A link to the zoom meeting will be sent to you after you register.

Title: Which Came First?

Using images of her quilts over the years, Ann will discuss making design decisions and how her approach has evolved. She will describe the different kinds of starting places she has used in her recent work and explain in detail how the work changed during its creation-from inspiration to result.

Time: 45 minutes plus time for discussion during and/or after.

About Ann Johnston ... Ann is best known for her hand-dyed silk and cotton quilts, seen in art exhibits since the 1980s. During her years of quiltmaking



and fabric dyeing she has authored and published many books, including these: The Contact: Sierra Nevada, Dyed and Stitched, The Quilter's Book of Design, 2nd Edition, Speaking in Cloth: 6 Quilters, 6 Voices; Color by Design: Paint and Print with Dye, 2nd Edition, Color By Accident: Low-Water Immersion Dyeing, and a 4.5-hour DVD: Color by Accident: Exploring Low-Water Immersion Dyeing, now available online. Since 2011 she has been working on a series of large-scale quilts called The Contact. The collection has been exhibited in various museums and venues in the US, as well as in France, England, Spain, and Saudi Arabia.

Ann attributes her artistic interests to an open mind and her desire to keep learning, independently and continuously. Her books, workshops, and lectures about dyeing and designing have been resources for fiber artists for many years. Her growing mastery of color and texture and design continues to produce powerful work that draws in her viewers and collectors. 


Kestrel's Creations - A Lecture/Trunk Show presented by Kestrel Michaud

This presentation will be offered by the Courthouse Cultural Center in conjunction with Floridian Flavors. It features a deep dive into Kestrel's creative history and artistic process. Her award-winning quilts are the culmination of a lifetime of artistic growth, and the first half of this presentation explains how she got to where she is today. It's a biographical look at her artistic life, from when she started drawing and won her first art show as a 9-year-old kid, through discovering fabric in High School, re-discovering fabric in art college, and finally transitioning to quilting in her late 20s. Kestrel will share artwork she's made in every phase of her life, although the focus is on the fabric.

The second half of "Kestrel's Creations" is about her process. Kestrel has used the same fundamental crea-

tive process for every fabric picture or quilt she's ever made, although her workflow underwent a major overhaul as she transitioned from analog to digital. Using behind-the-scenes photos and videos from the makings of multiple quilts, Kestrel will take you step-by-step through the process of her design in its entirety, from initial sketch to free-motion quilting.



Woven Tuna Weaving Journeys: Regina Dunn attended the art festival in DeLand in November. From Regina: "I visited with an artist in her booth that had marvelous weavings. They are done by a Peruvian artist and her studio is in Melbourne. It's called Woven Tuna. She said your POD

could do a tour and/or workshop." Sarina will follow-up and arrange a studio tour for (tentatively) April 09 in lieu of Play Day.

State Update: Kestrel - "All of this information is on the Google calendar I made for our Pod." Kathryn Robinson picked up the Floridian Flavors quilts last Wednesday, Jan 05, and transported them to Stuart. KC had stored them at her house. Thank you for the group effort, everyone!

Bookshare Dij Pacarro presented Elizabeth Barton's book, "Visual Guide to Working in a Series". The book includes ideas for creating a series and exercises to work on. Barton writes that working in a series provide where you can create your own voice and style, helps avoid putting too many things in one piece (but write them down for another piece) and planning, themes, design (shapes, form, content, and which need be constant.)

Program: Panel Discussion: "Working in a Series" was presented by Gabriele DiTota, KC Grapes, and Kestrel Michaud.

Gabriel noted from a video on the SAQA site that a series must be a related recognizable cohesive body of work. To be a SAQA Juried Artist one must have created a series.

KC showed and commented on her own art as a series and noted that a series is done when the artist is done working on it.

Kestrel noted a series must have more than one common factor, visually belong together, has no set number of pieces but usually a minimum of 5 and no maximum, demonstrate and exploration or interest. An artist should set at least two rules that all art in the series should follow. Her blog post on the topic: https://kestrelmichaud.com/blog/2021/how-to-work-in-a-series/


At 5:30 there will be a talk (again, free to all) by Fran Gardner, Professor of Art Emerita about the


Women Take Issue exhibit in the Main Atrium (I will have about 25 pieces exhibit along with Fran and Beau Wild.)
